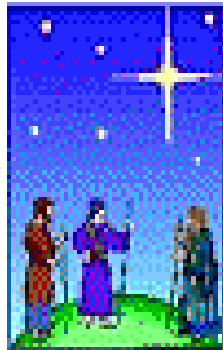

May the Christ child, now enthroned as King of Kings, bless you as you continue to rejoice in his amazing grace and proclaim his life-changing love.



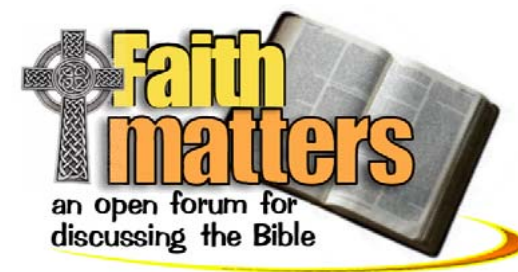

Thanks to Church, Academy and Community for your great contribution.



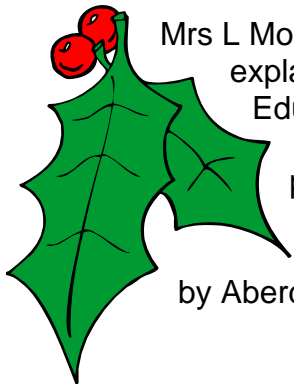


The Guild

On Monday 24 September the Guild welcomed Mrs J McKelvie who came to talk to us about “Scottish Castles”. Unfortunately, due to unforeseen circumstances, the meeting had to be curtailed at an early stage and we hope to have Mrs McKelvie back at a future date.

Rev J Watson was the speaker on Monday 8 October when the topic was “The Healing Ministry”. Mr Watson explained he had been in the police in Paisley until 1985 when he retired but was involved with his local church in collecting clothes for orphans in Poland and had managed to gather 30,000 tons of clothes in 3 years. He was called to the ministry but had no qualifications and went on to take highers etc and eventually studied for a degree and it was during this time he became interested in healing. Mr Watson attended a course in Florida and leads conferences at Carberry Towers. In 2005 he gained a qualification in healing and gave examples in the use of healing.

On Monday 22 October the Guild welcomed Mrs M Rennie whose topic was “Lace Making”. Mrs Rennie started making lace in 1990 after being introduced to it during a Girl Guide camp. She visits Bruges annually where she is a member of a group who stay in a convent and take part in Lace Making Seminar. Accommodation is basic and the group join in convent life while they are there. Mrs Rennie brought along examples of various types of lace and showed slides of Bruges.



Mrs L Morrice visited on Monday 12 November when she explained about “Project ALEC” (“Aberdeenshire Life Education Centres”). Mrs Morrice was a teacher with Aberdeenshire Council before becoming part of this project. ALEC started in Scotland in 2004 and Mrs Morrice underwent 3 months special training. Buying tat will, perhaps, raise a smile – that’s OK, but rather short term.

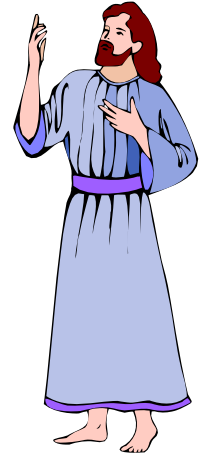
If you receive yet another lotion set, to join the other dust gatherers in the overflowing cupboard, is that going to buy happiness? Probably not.

Rotary Club of Oldmeldrum

The winter nights are drawing in and it will soon be time to prepare for the festive season. The Oldmeldrum Christmas lights ceremony is to be held on 2nd December and Santa and his sleigh will be there for children young and old to enjoy. Thereafter Santa and his sleigh will be touring the area and will be driving around Oldmeldrum on 18th and 19th December between 6pm and 8.30pm.

The Rotary organisation helps Charities locally, nationally and internationally. In this season of goodwill it should be remembered that in local, national and international Rotary Clubs, members promote world peace and understanding. One of the many medical initiatives is the money and support given to the eradication of polio. In 1985 Rotary International started a campaign to immunise the children of the world against polio. Rotary is a spearheading partner in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (the largest public health initiative the world has ever known) that has spanned 200 counties, utilised 20 million volunteers, immunised over 2 billion children, and probably spared 5 million from disability and averted more than a million deaths.

Closer to home our Club has been supporting a Shoe box scheme. In a very similar way to your Church's shoe box scheme we too are filling shoe boxes. Our empty cardboard shoe boxes have been distributed and filled by some of the local primary schools as well as by the members of the Club. Our members also support the pupils at Meldrum Academy by sponsoring senior pupils in leadership and enterprise skills, arranging mock interviews, organising the Young Musician of the Year and a Creative Writing competition as well as judging the technology challenge which involves all the primary schools associated with the Academy. We are delighted to have been awarded a certificate from Enterprise in Education for our cooperation with the Academy "to enhance pupil learning experiences and develop skills and attitudes".

symbols. The two major symbols stemming from the early church were ICHTUS (the fish) and, later, the cross.

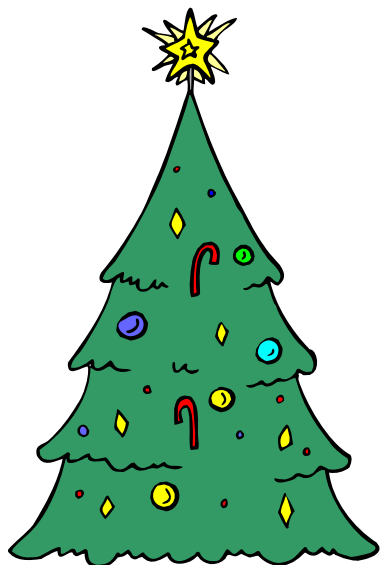


So what about Christmas for us today? If you think from the above that I'm about to pour cold water on the idea of Christmas (bah, humbug!) then you're very wrong. Christmas seeks to remind us that God's Son Jesus was born as human, that God came down to earth for our

sake because he loves us. What a great reason to celebrate! We Christians believe that God so loved the world that he gave his only son, that whoever believes in Him (trusts and puts their life in Him) will not die but will have eternal life (John 3:16). The Bible goes on to explain this further, "For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through him" (John 3:17). How do we know that Jesus is the Saviour? One of the ways is to look at if and how he fulfills what was written about the Promised Messiah long before his birth. For example, can you imagine someone predicting with accuracy the city in which a future Prime Minister would take place in the year 2707 (seven hundred years from now)? Well that's the scale of what the prophet Micah did 700 years before the Messiah when he wrote, "But you, Bethlehem Ephrathah, though you are small among the clans of Judah, out of you will come for me one who will be ruler over Israel, whose origins are from of old, from ancient times" (Micah 5:2). How difficult do you think it would be to give precise details of the death of a new, unknown, religious leader over 1000 years from today and at the same time invent and predict a new form of execution - not currently known - by which that exact individual would die? That's what David did in 1,000BC when he wrote Psalm 22 (have a look at it). On the other hand, if you thought-up fifty specific prophecies about some person in the future that you would never meet, how difficult would it be for him to fulfill all fifty of your predictions even when at least 25 of them were completely outwith his control? It's this scale of things we're talking about when we speak of Jesus in relation to the Hebrew Scriptures of ancient days.

So what do we believe about Christmas? We believe that Love came down at Christmas, for you and all of us!

What we believe about ... CHRISTMAS.



Christmas is an exciting time for lots of people, not just children. It is a time when we celebrate Jesus Christ's birth, although his actual date of birth is unknown. Christmas was not among the earliest festivals of the Church. It was not celebrated, commemorated, or observed by the apostles nor by the early church. In fact history reveals that only around 440 A.D. did the Church at Jerusalem commence the celebration of Christmas. It had been sufficient for the early Christians to know that Jesus, as their Lord and Saviour, had been born. They certainly praised God that Jesus Christ had come into the world, however, the day and the time of His

birth had no relevance for them because they worshipped him as the *risen, exalted* Christ – the King of Kings - who had died and rose again, not as a babe laid in a manger. So where does the celebration of Christmas in winter stem from?

December 25th was particularly important in the pre-Christian pagan cult of Mithras, a popular deity in the Old Roman Empire. Robert Myers (a proponent *for* celebrating Christmas) in his book *Celebrations*, says: "Prior to the celebration of Christmas, December 25th in the Roman world was the *Natalis Solis Invicti*, the Birthday of the unconquerable sun. "Yule" is a Chaldean word meaning "infant" and long before the coming of Christianity, the Anglo-Saxons called the 25th of December "Yule day" - in other words, "infant day" or "child's day". In the spread of Christianity this already existing celebration of *infant day* was given a new focus, the birth of the Saviour Jesus Christ as a baby in Bethlehem. Many symbols of Christmas, such as the Christmas tree, holly wreath and Yule log also have their roots in ancient beliefs and are not, in fact, Christian
